Political inequality

In 1790,
a voter in Delaware
(the least populous state)
had about thirteen times more influence
in the U.S. Senate than a voter in
the most populous state, Virginia.
In 2000,

by contrast, a voter in Wyoming has neary seventy times more influence in the U.S. Senate than a voter from California.

What began as a strictly small -state bias has become a rural -state bias.
