Power

By astronomical margins, would-be migrants would rather move to the US than to China. That hasn't stopped the one losing relative influence to the other over recent decades. Ultimately, if a country grows from 5 per cent of world output to 18 per cent, as China has since 1980, there is a limit to what the soft power of others can do to counteract it.

That kind of economic weight buys too much military hardware.
It spawns too many bilateral dependants in trade and investment.
It demands an answer in material power.
